




CFIC Vow Renewal: December 7

We celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary on December 8. This year, Archbishop Hebda will celebrate the Vigil Mass with us here at Saint Bonaventure Tuesday, December 7, at 6 p.m. and Fr. James, Fr. Jimmy, Fr. Benny, and Fr. Antony of the Sons of the Immaculate Conception (CFIC) will renew their religious vows in CFIC tradition.

Blessed Luigi Maria Monti founded the "Congregation of The Sons of the Immaculate Conception" in 1857 in Rome, three years after the proclamation of the "Doctrine of Immaculate Conception" by Blessed Pope Pius IX as infallible through the bull "Ineffabilis Deus" in 1854.

While proclaiming Luigi Monti "Blessed" on November 9, 2003, Pope Saint John Paul II said, "Monti entirely dedicated his life to healing the physical and spiritual wounds of the sick and the orphaned. He loved to call them "Christ's poor ones," and he served them, enlivened by a living faith and sustained by intense and continual prayer. In his evangelical commitment, he was constantly inspired by the example of the Holy Virgin and placed the Congregation he founded under the sign of Mary Immaculate."

To manifest his great devotion to the Immaculate Virgin, he wanted all the members of his religious order to renew their three evangelical councils (vows) of Chastity, Poverty, and Obedience when they celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception every year. Following the tradition, we joyfully honor our heavenly patroness on her Feast Day by renewing our vows during the Holy Eucharist.

In March 1980, the Buildings and Grounds committee completed a remodeling project in the friary kitchen and dining room, installing custom cabinets, wallpaper, and fresh paint. While you can still take in that vintage wallpaper, only minor upgrades and maintenance have taken place since then, including the current oven and refrigerator being replaced in 2005.

In June of 2018, there was a plan to remodel the kitchen. In the end, it was decided to carpet the rec room and hallway, install plank flooring in the dining room, and have the original house section of the Friary repainted professionally.

Historically, the friars at Saint Bonaventure have had either a cook or meals prepared for them. Since the CFIC priests cook together, it makes sense to revisit and update those 2018 plans to open up underutilized adjoining spaces to make an excellent space for cooking and eating together in 2022.

More or Less Trees

We have hundreds of beautiful trees on our property, such as ash, birch, maple, a vast array of evergreens, and many other types of trees. Recently, we removed ten trees due to disease and others that were dying or partly dead. Half of the trees removed were ash trees with emerald ash borer disease. After the city’s inspection, we learned they would come by to mark them for removal this fall. We still have about 45 ash trees on our property, and unfortunately, anticipate gradually removing many of them in the near future due to disease.

We began planning for this reality several years ago by planting various new trees knowing disease would likely hit our trees sooner or later. We still have many beautiful trees and a large variety of types trees on our beautiful property. Landscaping our grounds has always been a work in progress. We wanted to keep you informed about activities you may have seen on the grounds lately.

SYNOD 2022

Thank you for joining us in the discussion during the Synod Small Groups! We had a small but dedicated group that gathered at Saint Bonaventure. Thousands gathered at parishes throughout the Archdiocese this fall for the Parish Consultation with Small Groups, where we discussed the focus areas for the Archdiocesan Synod:

- Forming parishes that are in the service of evangelization.
- Forming missionary disciples who know Jesus's love and respond to his call.
- Forming youth and young adults in and for a Church that is always young.

The Small Groups were one of several important steps in preparation for the Archdiocesan Synod Assembly in June 2022. The pre-Synod process began with the listening sessions in fall 2019 engaging the People of God — laity, clergy, consecrated men and women, and bishops — all walking together at the personal, parish, deanery, and Archdiocesan levels. Ideas from the small groups will inform the Archdiocesan Synod Assembly. The process culminates with the Archdiocesan Synod Assembly to be held Pentecost weekend, June 3-5, 2022. Recommendations from that Assembly will shape a pastoral letter Archbishop Hebda plans to release in November 2022, followed by a pastoral plan for the future of the archdiocese.

Cloud of Witnesses features saints as a focus of racial reconciliation

The Cloud of Witnesses, features eight framed images of men and women representing various ethnicities, each accentuated with a hand-painted gold halo symbolizing their sainthood.

“The saints reveal to us the reality that the Christian message is about conformity to Christ,” said Father Nathan LaLiberte, 36, pastor of Nativity of Mary.

“The fact that they have come from a variety of backgrounds, cultures and races, and yet have pursued a singular focus, is amazing in itself,” he said.

“Then, reveal some of the heroic things that these individuals did, and they truly are inspiring witnesses for us to follow.”

The project began after the May 25, 2020, police-involved killing in Minneapolis of Floyd, who was Black, and the protests that followed.

“A parishioner, Ben Heidgerken, contacted me about his desire to have some sort of a response that was ‘Catholic’ to our community, which has a racial background that is largely white, with a minority of African, Hispanic (and) Asian members,” Father LaLiberte said.

The two brainstormed about an art series depicting saints, and Heidgerken, 37, identified eight saints whose lives involved cultural misunderstanding and conflict: St. Juan Diego, St. Martin de Porres, St. Pedro Calungsod, Blessed Christian de Cherge, St. Josephine Bakhita, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, St. Teresa of Kolkata and Venerable Henriette Delille.

“By telling their stories, we learn to imitate the virtues that they displayed in the face of the conflict they experienced,” said Heidgerken.

The Cloud of Witnesses was unveiled at Nativity of Mary on Pentecost Sunday. In his homily, Father LaLiberte noted the feast of Pentecost “reveals to the world that God is not bound to one culture, race or location, but is desiring to be experienced by every people.”

“‘Cloud of Witnesses’ comes from the Book of Revelation text that speaks about there being, in heaven, a cloud of witnesses from every nation, tongue and people, who are before the throne, praising God for all eternity,” Father LaLiberte said.

The installation has led to “new and unexpected conversations” with members of the parish community, Heidgerken said. He plans to take a traveling set of the images to other parishes during Advent and Lent, beginning with Saint Bonaventure.

Our Lady of the Angels Adoration Chapel is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, except when Mass is being celebrated. On November 21, Christ the King Sunday, we celebrated 21 years of our chapel and perpetual adoration at Saint Bonaventure. Last year, Bishop Cozzens celebrated Mass for the Feast of Christ the King and shared this in his homily:

I have one practical piece of advice for you: if you'd like to make Christ more the king of your life, if you'd like to experience the healing of these ruptures, the freedom from slavery that Jesus wants to give, if you want to learn to love God and neighbor and self the way Jesus does, then I've got one practical suggestion: come to adoration! Come to the perpetual adoration that happens in this church every day.

What happens when I come to adoration? I kneel before him, acknowledging that he's the king. And I surrender my mind, and my heart, and my will, and my body to him. As I read his word and I speak with him about the struggles I'm having to love my neighbor, he fills my heart with his Holy Spirit. He helps me to see my struggles the way he sees them, he helps me to see my neighbor the way he sees them, and in that time I spend with him having that heart-to-heart conversation, he becomes more my king.

Turkey Bingo Back—The sloppy joes and bingo were HOT! Prizes included 11 turkeys and side dish baskets.


